What are the local elections on the 5th May – what are you voting for?

One Executive Mayor for Tower Hamlets – one ballot paper

Who has all of the power and responsibility, a single person in charge, which is what residents voted for last May in the referendum

There is NO relationship between a vote for the Mayor and a vote for Councillors You do NOT need to vote for a Councillor from Party X to get a Mayor from party X

45 Councillors in 20 wards – each ward has 1, 2 or 3 Councillors – one ballot paper

Councillors have no power unless the Mayor chooses to share it with them

They decide some planning & licensing applications, and make some pensions decisions

They can ask the Mayor & their team questions but cannot change what the Mayor does except they can vote down the Mayors budget (but only if 2/3's agree)

Their main role is to scrutinize the Mayor, to ask questions, to help you

You have 2 votes for Mayor

1st preference – X in first column

2nd preference - X in 2nd column (or can leave empty)

Count 1st preferences first – if a candidate gets 50%+ 1 they are elected which is what happened in 2010 when Lutfur Rahman was elected

If nobody gets 50% keep the top two candidates – and then count the 2nd preferences of all the other candidates

Add their 2nd preference votes to 1st preference votes of the top two to decide ultimate winner – see 2018 as an example

You have one vote for each Councillor in the ward

For example, Island Gardens ward has 2 Councillor's

So you get 2 votes

Top 2 candidates win, no 2nd preferences

Some wards have 3 Councillors, Poplar & Limehouse wards only one


Biggest party usually wins thanks to First Past the Post voting system

But note how mixed-up results were here as clearly not everybody used their 2 votes to vote for only one party

Otherwise the Labour, Conservative, Liberal Democrat candidates would have got the same number of votes!

Some people voted tactically!

Why you should vote tactically if you want some opposition in Tower Hamlets



May 2018 46% of you vote for Labour Councillors but as biggest party = 42 out of the 45 Councillors elected where from the Labour Party (so 46% vote = 93% of Councillors)
